This second issue of $K \dot{\alpha} \mu \pi \sigma_S$ follows essentially the same pattern as its predecessor. All the articles printed here were presented in lecture form to a Cambridge audience during the immediately preceding academic year (i.e. 1993-94); this prerequisite remains an essential feature of the enterprise. It is not our intention that $K \dot{\alpha} \mu \pi \sigma_S$ should compete with established scholarly journals in the field of Modern Greek studies. We shall not therefore accept unsolicited contributions; we shall restrict ourselves to the publication of "Cambridge papers".

We firmly believe that publication of the edited texts of a selection of lectures, within months of their oral delivery, is not only of interest to a local public but also serves the needs of a wider community of students and scholars in the various disciplines associated with Modern Greek studies. We have already enlisted subscribers in other countries, and indeed other continents. We are most grateful for the support and encouragement we have received, but conscious that all such ventures need continuity and - not least - financial security if they are to survive their infancy. An increase in the number of subscribers will certainly facilitate our forward planning and help to ensure the economic viability of our publication.
